What is a urinary tract infection (UTI)?

An infection in part of the urinary system, typically most infections involve the lower urinary tract
the urethra or bladder.

How do I know if I have a UTI?

- The most common symptom you will feel is the need to pass urine urgently and frequently.
- Burning or stinging can be felt when passing urine.
- You may notice blood in the urine or discomfort in the lower abdomen.

What causes a UTI?

- being sexually active or pregnant.
- Hormonal changes such as menopause
- Diabetes mellitus

Treatment

- Simple analgesia can help ease pain or discomfort.
- A short course of antibiotics is a common treatment for most women.
- Some UTIs may self-resolve after a few days without treatment.
- Continue to drink plenty of water.
- Please seek urgent medical advice to assess your condition if you feel more unwell, or develop back pain, fevers or vomiting to assess your condition.
